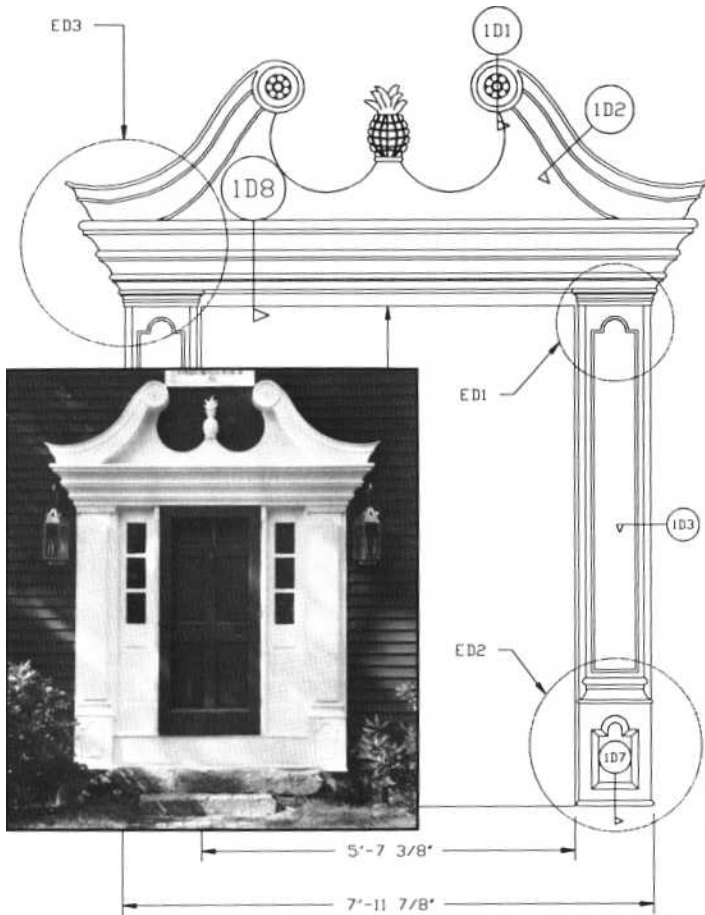


ARCHITECTURAL WOODWORK

For our purposes, Architectural Woodwork will include wooden moldings, trim, paneling and carvings that are not part of a window, door or jamb.

Generally, Architectural Woodwork does include Columns; Entablatures with Cornice, Frieze and Architrave; Dentil Block; Baseboards; Skirtboards; Exterior & Interior Casing; Wainscoting & Paneling; Carved Pediments; etc..



Architectural Woodwork can include standard flat casing and complex blind nailed molded overlays. Often, in some complex detailing, there are as many interrelational dimension considerations as there are with the most complex Fanlites. Subtle detail profiles can make the difference between a generally inexpensive facade and one with multiple returns and custom profiles that is very expensive.

For best results in traditional Architectural Woodwork, consult your architect or historical curator.

The illustration (left) includes a hand carved Scrolled Pediment with traditional pineapple finial, an Entablature over the Paneled Columns and Raised Arched Top Panel Column Bases. This facade was designed for an existing door and sidelites on an historic colonial residence. The Pineapple is a traditional symbol of welcome.
